* Students will interact with nature and culture in the southwest while they research, investigate, experience, and persuade in a collaborative learning experience. Participants will visit a number of significant sites (these may include, for example, Amerind Museum, Arizona Historical Society Museum, Desert Sonoran Museum, Kartchner Caverns, Kitt Peak Observatory, Reid Park Zoo, Tucson Botanical Gardens, etc.) in and around southeastern Arizona that emphasize the cultural and/or natural history of the southwest, during an overnight weekend trip

Evaluation will be based on three components: 1) a pre-trip group presentations featuring one of the sites to be visited; 2) a written journal recording observations and reactions to sites visited; and 3) a persuasive article (written in the form of a press release) describing the significance on one site. + This three-credit-hour seminar will focus on trends affecting the changing workplace (automation, globalization, and innovation) from the perspectives of studies in sociology, economics, and religion. The course will follow a seminar format with significant writing and active student participation. It will include exercises in values clarification and occupational research, to assist each student in planning a meaningful and viable career in a rapidly changing economy. It is an upper division course, directed to juniors and seniors in the honors program. Others may be invited to enroll on an individual basis.
